I have today dismissed from the service the person
who has been acting as my ~~comptroller~~ or secretary
and it is necessary that an other person should have
be selected at the earliest practical moment. I would
prefer a man with a family - his salary to twelve
hundred dollars - legal funds for Annam - a home
will be provided, one cow to milk, a garden ground
etc. The subsisting himself. I am desirous
the services of all who are not fit for my situation
where it is possible to spare them, and shall
not employ one unless he is approved by the
conference committee, for in this case my
successor will not be likely to remove him.
And I do hope that I shall be relieved at an
early day for I can no longer labor with
that ~~great~~ and hope of success so hopeless
and my greatest desire now is to abandon the
work and attend to my own affairs.

I have forwarded my resignation, which
was perhaps unnecessary, on account of the action
of the conference committee, but fearing it might
be delayed too long I sent it forward. My
family and that of my son have already left

and I would gladly follow tomorrow if it
were possible.

I still feel a deep interest in the
progress and prosperity of this people, but since
the action of the conference committee and
the publication of your article in the Advocate
I cannot reconcile my own feelings of propriety
by remaining in the service under your
jurisdiction, and I shall therefore leave
as soon as I can be relieved.
