RESOLUTIONS PASSED AT THE SEVENTH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE IZAAK WALTON LEAGUE JULY 19, 20, 21, 1935

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE OREGON STATE COUNCIL OF THE IZAAK WALTON LEAGUE OF AMERICA, that the president be authorized and instructed to appoint a committee of five members of the league to act during the interim between now and the next state convention, in urging upon the Oregon State Planning Committee and other like bodies the consideration of the preservation and protection of wild life in all programs of such bodies, particularly we urge that in the Willamette valley project, provision be made for water areas to provide resting and nesting grounds for wild fowl. We suggest a series of dams or other provision for flooding an area on the Long Tom and the acquisition of Wapato lake and its creation as a permanent wild fowl preserve be made project number one in a program for preservation of wild fowl in Oregon and that the creation of a like water area and preserve in the region of the Long Tom be made project number two, but desire that the interim committee hereby provide for cooperate with all other agencies to the end that the state planning be done with the view of fully protecting and conserving the wild life of the state and promoting the state's wild life resources to the utmost.
