Dear Mr. Finley:

We are trying to determine how the technical advisory committees of the Board's Advisory Research Council can be of most help to the Board during the next five or six months.

I believe you feel that there is real need for conserving wild life and establishing bird reserves and wild life refuges in different parts of the state.

The State Planning Board, with the help of a recently approved W.P.A. staff project, is endeavoring to prepare during the next six or eight months and submit to Governor Martin and the national administration, a comprehensive report describing the resources, problems, needs and opportunities for future progress and state development.

We would very much appreciate it if you could let us know whether your advisory committee on Wild Life could contribute a section on wild life problems and needs as part of this comprehensive report. I should also appreciate your suggestions concerning how the report which your subcommittee on Wild Life (of the Forestry Division), which you prepared last winter, could be made most useful. We are trying to inform the people of the state of the principal problems and needs affecting development of the state's natural resources and I believe your last winter's report contains material which could be used to good advantage for this purpose. Also, will you please let me know whether you think it advisable to send copies of your last winter's report to agencies such as the U. S. Biological Survey, Izaak Walton League, county courts, county planning commissions and similar state and federal officials?

What would you think of our making such state maps showing areas which your committee feels should be set aside as wild life refuges and bird preserves? We have some draftsmen under our W.P.A. staff project and could prepare some maps which might show forcefully and graphically what should be done to protect and preserve our wild life.

I do not know whether you have completed the organization of your Wild Life Committee and should appreciate being informed of who the other members are, and whether you feel you could hold meetings during the winter months to discuss some of these problems.

I shall be very glad to hear what you think your committee can do to help the Board in your field.
