**ACTOR IN LECTURE SERIES**



This Kodiak bear will cavort in 5000 feet of motion pictures of Alaska wild life to be shown by Naturalist William L. Finley, lecturer on the Saturday program of the Junior League in the Benson Tech auditorium.

The Saturday morning series sponsored by the Junior League of Portland will open the season at 10:30 a. m. November 13 in the Benson Tech auditorium, when William L. Finley, nationally known naturalist and lecturer, will speak. His topic, "Birds, Bergs and Kodiak Bears," will be a personal account of his experience on the Pack-Finley expeditions to Alaska. From more than 20,000 feet of motion picture negative exposed on these expeditions, Finley has chosen 5000 feet to illustrate his talk.

In his career Finley has photographed everything that runs, flies or swims in Oregon. With Mrs. Finley and their two children, he has cruised up and down the Pacific coast from Mexico to Alaska. They have motored and packed from the Texas coast up through the great desert regions to the Canadian border. With camera and notebook, they

have explored the highest passes of the Cascade and Rocky mountain ranges and most of the national parks. They have scaled the snow-capped peaks of Jefferson, Hood and Rainier. Many sessions of travel and adventure have produced 200,000 feet of motion picture film and 50,000 still life negatives, the most remarkable record of American wild animal pictures ever collected. Finley was associated with the National Association of Audubon societies and the Oregon Audubon society for years. He is also a member of the staff of Nature magazine and field naturalist for American Nature association.

In search of wild life to photograph and study in Alaska, Finley and Arthur N. Pack, president of the American Nature association, were guided by the best known hunter in Alaska, A. Hasselborg. The lecture will be the first of the series of five varied programs for children.

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
