"Before the government allots \$62,000,000 to build seven dams on the upper Willamette, let's know whether it's the right thing or not. Every stream has five or six dif-Every stream has five or six dif-ferent public values. Let's study this Willamette valley project and make certain that it won't destroy more than it creates.

"Let's find the facts and then follow the facts."

Mr. Finley's tour, on which he was accompanied by Mrs. Finley, took him through the south, midwest, east and New England and back to Detroit for the convention of the National Wildlife federation.

More research and less politics is the need of conservation the nation over, he said. Missouri, he declared, has been most successful in keeping.

has been most successful in keeping politics out of conservation. In that state a constitutional amendment paved the way for a non-political conservation board. An immediate result was a \$100,000 gift from a wealthy conservationist.
